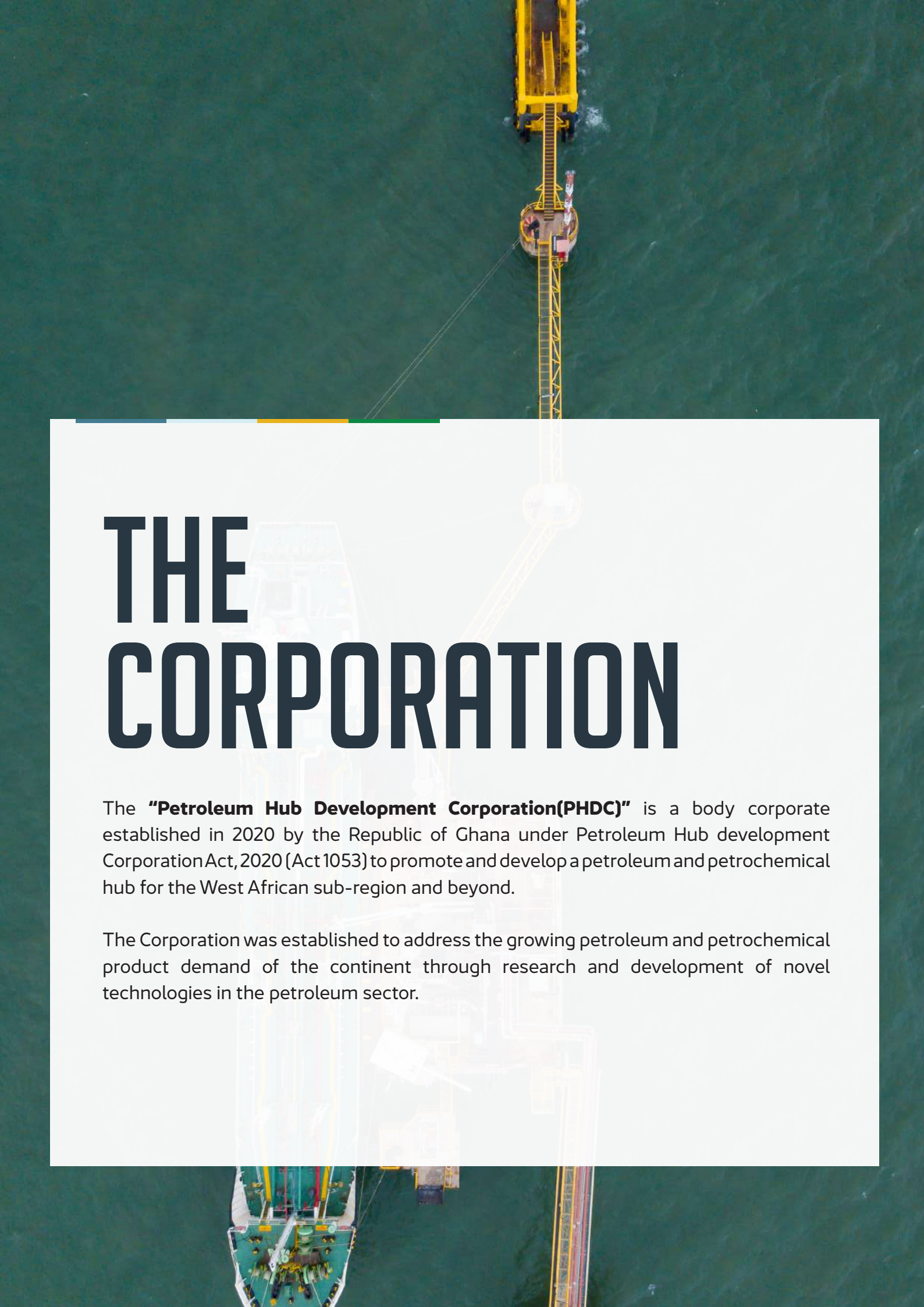

THE CORPORATION

The “**Petroleum Hub Development Corporation(PHDC)**” is a body corporate established in 2020 by the Republic of Ghana under Petroleum Hub development Corporation Act, 2020 (Act 1053) to promote and develop a petroleum and petrochemical hub for the West African sub-region and beyond.

The Corporation was established to address the growing petroleum and petrochemical product demand of the continent through research and development of novel technologies in the petroleum sector.

DR TONI AUBYNN CALLS ON WESTERN REGIONAL HOUSE OF CHIEFS AS ENGAGEMENT ON REDUCED LAND SIZE KICKS OFF



As Ghana's Petroleum Hub project enters a critical phase of its development, the Petroleum Hub Development Corporation, which is the organisation charged with the promotion of the project, has embarked on what is believed to be a high-level stakeholder engagement to brief key stakeholders in the Western Region on a series of crucial developments about the project.

On Thursday, April 9, 2024, a delegation from the PHDC, led by its Chief Executive Officer, Dr Toni Aubynn, paid a courtesy call on the Western Regional House of Chiefs to brief the chiefs on the resizing of the land earmarked for the project, following a directive from President John Dramani Mahama and in response to feedback from various stakeholders.

During the meeting held at the Western Regional House of Chiefs' office in Sekondi-Takoradi, Dr. Toni Aubynn highlighted significant progress made since the PHDC's engagement with President Mahama in November 2025.

According to Dr Aubynn, one key outcome of that engagement was a presidential directive to reduce the size of the allocated land. Since then, the PHDC has been working closely with the Ministry of Lands and Natural Resources through the Lands Commission to implement the directive.

He explained that preliminary work by the Lands Commission has now made it necessary for the PHDC to engage all relevant stakeholders in the Western Region to keep them informed about the timelines for the land acquisition process.

Dr. Aubynn expressed confidence that, with the strong support of the Minister of Lands and Natural Resources, Hon. Emmanuel Armah-Kofi Buah, and the Minister of Energy and Green Transition, Hon. Dr. John Abdulai Jinapor, the land acquisition process would be successfully concluded.

He disclosed that the land size for the project is being reduced from the original 20,000 acres to 12,300 acres and assured the chiefs that this reduction would not compromise the integrity, development, or operational efficiency of the project.

"The President made it clear that the Petroleum Hub project is very dear to him. He views it as a transformative initiative that will benefit not only Ghana but the entire region. Following petitions received concerning the land size, the President directed that we be allocated 5,000 hectares, equivalent to 12,300 acres. We are confident that this size is sufficient to successfully develop and operationalise the project," Dr. Aubynn stated.

"After our meeting with the President, he issued two key directives. The first was to the Sector Minister, Hon. Dr John Abdulai Jinapor, to assist in securing funding for the project. The second was to the Minister of Lands and Natural Resources, Hon. Emmanuel Armah-Kofi Buah, to ensure the land is secured. Both ministers have acted swiftly. The Lands Commission was immediately tasked with commencing work, and productive engagements between the Commission and the PHDC have been ongoing since then."

"The Lands Commission has completed the reconnaissance exercise, and we are now moving into the actual field work. At this crucial stage, we deemed it important to engage the respected House of Chiefs and the elders of Jomoro," he added.

Dr. Aubynn further assured the chiefs that the Petroleum Hub project continues to attract strong interest from investors who are ready to commit substantial funds once the land acquisition process is finalised.

In response, the President of the Western Regional House of Chiefs, Nana Kobina Nketia V, described the PHDC's visit as timely, especially given recent global developments that underscore the importance of ambitious infrastructure projects like the Petroleum Hub.

He commended President Mahama's personal interest in the project, noting that successfully delivering it would represent a significant and lasting legacy that would strengthen Ghana's energy security and create sustainable employment opportunities for citizens.

Nana Kobina Nketsia V urged the government to adequately resource the PHDC to enable it to carry out its mandate effectively.

The meeting also provided a platform for open dialogue, as the chiefs shared valuable insights and suggestions on how best to address land acquisition challenges and ensure the project's smooth and successful implementation.

The PHDC delegation included Deputy CEO for Operations and Technical, Onasis Rosely, Advisor on Strategy and Sustainability, Dr. Kwame Baah-Nuakoh, Head of Human Capital and General Services, Adwoa Osaebia Konadu, Senior Manager for Communications and PR, Favour E. Nunoo and Business Manager for the CEO, Ebenezer Potakey.

PETROLEUM HUB LAND SIZE REDUCED TO 12,356 ACRES – PHDC UPDATES WESTERN REGIONAL MINISTER



As part of his stakeholder engagement drive in the Western Region, the Chief Executive Officer of the Petroleum Hub Development Corporation (PHDC), Dr Toni Aubynn, called on the Western Regional Minister, Hon. Joseph Nelson, on Thursday, April 9, 2026.

Dr Aubynn explained that following the President's directive to reduce the project land size from 20,000 acres to 12,300 acres, the PHDC and the Lands Commission have made significant progress in the land acquisition process.

He noted that the process has now reached a critical stage, with on-site activities expected to commence soon. For this

reason, the PHDC deemed it necessary to engage the Regional Minister and other key stakeholders to keep them abreast of developments.

Dr Aubynn commended Hon. Joseph Nelson for his sustained interest and proactive support for the Petroleum Hub project, particularly his consistent follow-ups.

He assured the Minister that the PHDC is making steady progress and emphasised the importance of continuous stakeholder engagement.

Hon. Joseph Nelson welcomed the update, describing it as progressive and reassuring. He expressed confidence that the development would help restore faith among the people of Jomoro and the wider Western Region.

The Regional Minister said he was pleased with the progress report on the land resizing and acquisition process, noting that it demonstrated a serious commitment to the project.

He also lauded Dr Toni Aubynn for his visionary and dedicated leadership, stating that his tenure has brought renewed energy and momentum to the initiative.

"I am particularly impressed with the level of leadership you have shown," he remarked. "It is reassuring to have someone with your experience and commitment at the helm. I am confident you will deliver."

Hon. Nelson further commended the Lands Commission for its efforts and stressed the

need for effective coordination and clear communication to address all land-related challenges.

Also present at the meeting was DCOP Frank Abrokwah, the Western Regional Police Commander, who assured the PHDC of maximum security and full protection as it carries out its duties in the region.

PETROLEUM HUB PROJECT HOLDS MASSIVE POTENTIAL FOR WESTERN REGION – WESTERN REGIONAL MINISTER

PETROLEUM HUB HAS COME TO STAY IN JOMORO

– *Awulae Kwasi Armahchi III*

The Paramount Chief of the Western Nzema Traditional Area, Awulae Kwasi Armahchi III, has urged the government and the Petroleum Hub Development Corporation (PHDC) to ignore external voices opposing the Petroleum Hub project. He declared that the project enjoys the overwhelming support of the chiefs and residents of the Jomoro area.

According to Awulae Kwasi Armahchi III, the chiefs and elders of Jomoro fully recognise the massive transformative potential of the Petroleum Hub project and are therefore not only open to it but are eager for its successful implementation.

Addressing a PHDC delegation led by Chief Executive Officer Dr. Toni Aubynn during a stakeholder engagement on Friday, April 10,

2026, the Awulae expressed reservations about the reduction of the project land from the original 20,000 acres to 12,300 acres (5,000 hectares). However, he made it clear that his office and the people of Jomoro will not contest the new land size.

He rallied his people, urging them to focus on the long-term future of Jomoro rather than on the immediate benefits they could derive from using the land for other purposes.

The Awulae warned that the Western Nzema Traditional Council will not tolerate any individual or institution that attempts to undermine or delay the progress of the project, emphasising that such actions could ultimately prevent the initiative from coming to fruition.



"The PHDC delegation took a noble step to seek our blessings before beginning work on the project site. I'm grateful to them for the respect they've accorded this house. The land for the project belongs to me, and I have no problem with it.

"As the Awulae, my immediate focus isn't on making money and derailing the progress of Nzema. I want my people to know that I seek peace, progress and employment for our youth. These are the most important things to me, so I don't care about land size. All I want are jobs for my people. I see the developments in other areas, and I want my people to experience the same progress.

"Those who want to drag us back, I want you to know that we are marching forward. The Petroleum Hub project will be developed here in Jomoro. Posterity will judge all of us, so we must do what is in the interest of our people. We are going to develop the project, and it will be done on my land, so everyone must know and come on board. Petroleum Hub has come to stay, and it has come to stay in Jomoro," he said.

The Awulae urged the chiefs and influential figures in the various towns to serve as ambassadors for the project and to secure the full buy-in of their people by highlighting its potential to drive employment and development in the area.

In response, the Chief Executive Officer of the PHDC, Dr Toni Aubynn, expressed gratitude to Awulae Kwasi Armahchi III for his words of assurance, noting that they would significantly boost the Corporation's efforts.

He assured the Awulae that the PHDC remains committed to continuous engagement and will fully develop the project.

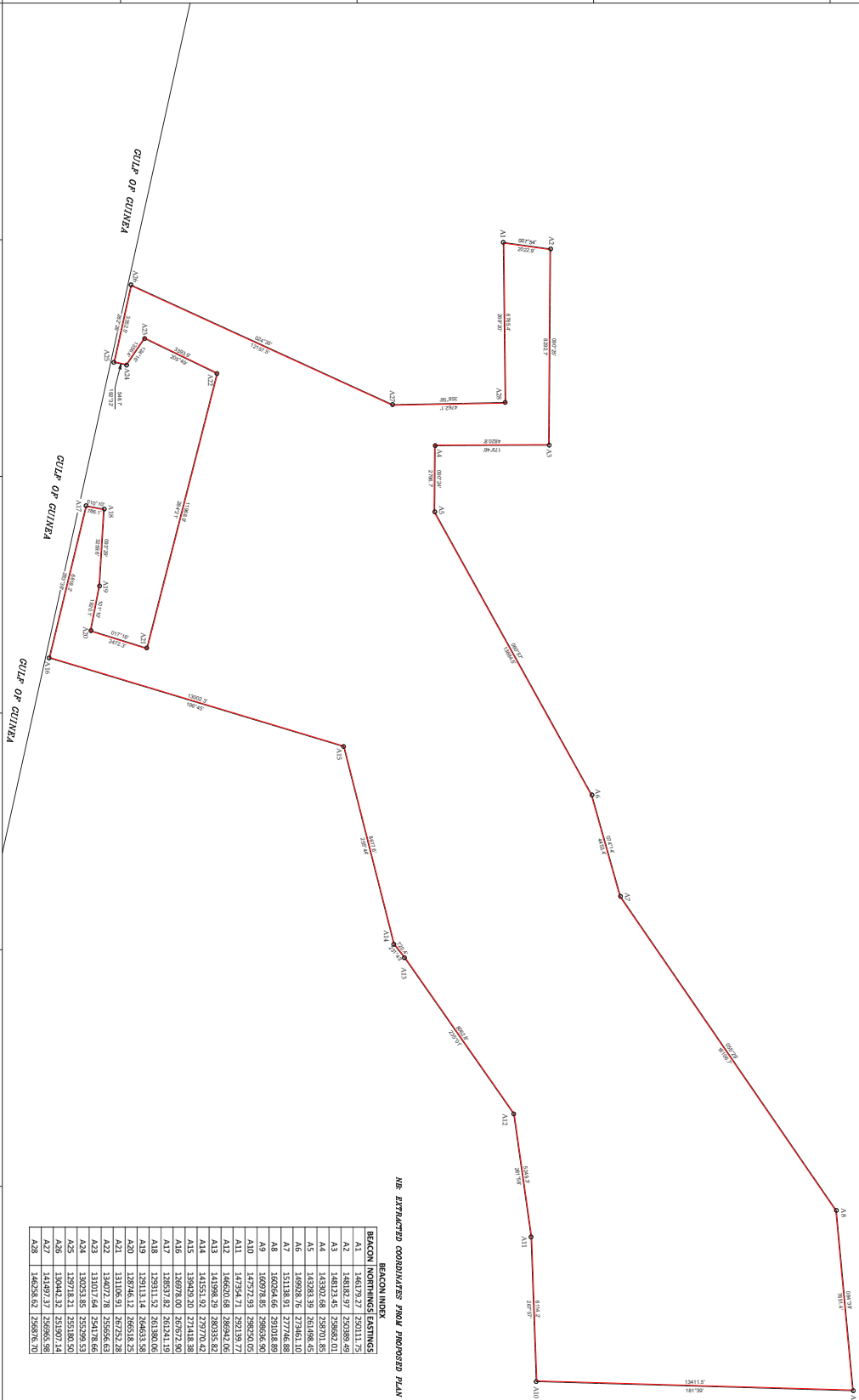

PHDC ASSURES FAIR COMPENSATION AND JOBS AS COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TAKES OFF IN JOMORO



Following the successful completion of a high level stakeholder engagement in the Western Region last week, the Petroleum Hub Development Corporation has kick started community engagement and sensitization efforts in Jomoro to raise awareness about the resizing and acquisition of land for its integrated petroleum and petrochemical complex which has now been reduced from 20,000 acres to 12,300 acres (5000 hectares).

The community engagement, which began on Monday, April 20, 2025, forms a critical part of the land acquisition process and is being led by the Lands Commission, with the PHDC, represented by Deputy Chief Executive Officer Onasis Rosely, playing a supporting role.

On the first day, the joint Lands Commission and PHDC team held town hall meetings in two affected communities: Old Kabenlasuazo and Egbazo.

Regional Lands Commissioner Addresses Communities

Nana Asante Boateng, the Regional Lands Commissioner for the Western Region, explained the purpose of the engagements in detail.



He maintained that the Lands Commission is fulfilling a key requirement in the land acquisition process and assured residents that the Commission is committed to protecting their interests.

He pledged prompt payment of fair and adequate compensation to all affected persons and assured them that every legitimate interest in the land, as outlined in the Land Act, 2020, would be duly compensated.

Nana Boateng also clarified that once compensation is paid by the PHDC, ownership and control of the land would be transferred accordingly.

His presentation opened the floor for questions from residents of Old Kabenlasuazo and Egbazo, where the main concerns raised centred on the delayed start of the project and job opportunities for the youth in the area.

Community Leaders Voice Concerns



At Egbazo, the Tufuhene, Abizi Kojo, acknowledged the residents' justifiable concerns regarding employment opportunities, citing past experiences.

While welcoming the project, he noted growing doubts over the delayed implementation and called for expedited action.

In Old Kabenlasuazo, the elders expressed similar concerns but declared their full readiness to relocate to pave the way for the project.

They highlighted that developmental projects in the community earmarked for resettlement had stalled and urged the PHDC to fast-track the relocation process.

DCEO Onasis Rosely Responds

In response, Deputy Chief Executive Officer in charge of Operations and Technical, Onasis Rosely (also referred to as Onasis Kobby), urged the people of Jomoro to fully support the project, describing it as having the potential to transform the area into the "Rotterdam of Africa."



Addressing the issue of delays, he cited government transitions and protests over land size as key setbacks and assured that with these challenges now resolved, he expressed optimism that the project would be executed on schedule.

On job creation, Onasis Rosely assured residents that the PHDC has developed a specific plan with the youth of Jomoro at its core. He encouraged them to trust the Corporation and to take full advantage of upcoming training opportunities designed to build their skills and prepare them for the project's implementation.

He further reassured the communities that the PHDC would not short-change them and has put in place alternative livelihood programmes for those who will lose land during the acquisition process.

The stakeholder engagement continues today, with the team scheduled to visit additional communities, including Takinta and Bonyere.

DAY 2 OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT: SHIFTING PERCEPTION ON THE PETROLEUM HUB PROJECT



The community engagement in the Jomoro Municipality is yielding positive results, as communities that previously had a reputation for resisting and opposing the Petroleum Hub concept have undergone a transformative change and are now fully supportive of the project.

On Day Two of the exercise, the PHDC and Lands Commission team visited four communities to inform them about the reduction of land size from 20,000 acres to 12,356 acres (5,000 hectares) and other key issues related to the project.

A crucial aspect of this engagement is the presentation of the gazette letter from

the Lands Commission to the local chiefs, which officially announces government's intention to acquire the designated lands.

Led by the Western Regional Lands Commissioner, Nana Asante Boateng, this process is conducted in full view of the public to ensure transparency and openness.

Nana Asante Boateng conveyed the purpose of the visit and guided the communities through the land acquisition process, assuring them of the Lands Commission's commitment to protecting their interests by guaranteeing fair, adequate, and prompt compensation.

During the team's first stop at Takinta on Day Two, there were poignant moments as community members, contrary to widespread belief, declared their complete support for the petroleum hub project.

They rejected the reputation imposed on them as opponents of the project, stating that while they may have questions regarding certain issues, they always believed in the project as a key driver of growth.

As one of the communities significantly affected by the land reduction, Nana Abizi IV, the Chief of Takinta, expressed deep regret and criticised some locals who became prominent opponents of the hub project.

He urged the PHDC not to let the actions of a few individuals reflect on the majority of community members who have historically supported the project wholeheartedly.

The Deputy CEO of Operations and Technical at PHDC, Onasis Rosely, stated that now that the decision on the land size for the project has been made, it is vital for all Jomoro residents to come on board to ensure the project's success.

Onasis Rosely encouraged them to focus on the socio-economic benefits the project is likely to create and to work towards gaining the full confidence of the community members.

From Takinta, the team travelled to New Kabenlasuazo, where the chief, Nana Kabenla Tendele, warmly welcomed them and urged the PHDC and Lands Commission to disregard detractors and concentrate on transforming the area.

He expressed disappointment upon discovering that one of the lead

campaigners against the project has a business interest in the community, quickly clarifying that this individual's actions do not represent the views of the entire community.

Similar positive feedback was received from Bonyere and Ezinlibo, where local assemblymen led discussions encouraging their constituents to consider future generations and allow the project to be established in their communities, as it will transform Jomoro into a modernised city.

You'll be the biggest beneficiaries of Petroleum Hub project – Jomoro MCE tells Youth



The Municipal Chief Executive of Jomoro, Hon. Benedict Boadi, has encouraged the youth of the municipality to support the Petroleum Hub project.

Speaking to chiefs and residents of Tikobo 1 on April 22, 2026, during the third day of a community engagement exercise by the Petroleum Hub Development and the Lands Commission, he highlighted Tikobo 1's strategic position to benefit from the project's development.

Hon. Boadi averred that Tikobo's reputation as a leading economic hub, along with its proximity to the project site, could lead to significant socio-economic growth.

He urged the youth to recognize the challenge of job scarcity in the area and to refrain from solely seeking employment

opportunities from external companies in the Nzema enclave.

He expressed that the establishment of the petroleum hub marks a transformative period for Jomoro, fulfilling a long-held desire for the presence of major corporations.

"When people talk about Nzema and Jomoro, one of the towns that easily come up is Tikobo 1. You are one of the commercially viable towns in Nzema and because of your closeness to the project site, you stand a great chance of benefiting from the project.

"People would love to rent houses, build hotels and open businesses here because of your location and the name you've created over the years so let's think about the benefits. The youth of Tikobo and Jomoro will be the biggest beneficiaries from the project so let's stop listening to the detractors and focus on what will help us," he said.

Chief Nana Namoah Ackah Arizi II of Tikobo 1 acknowledged the overall support for the project among local chiefs but raised concerns regarding delays in compensation, which have caused uncertainty.

He assured that the community is committed to the project but called on the Lands Commission and the Petroleum Hub Development Corporation to expedite the compensation process to ensure fair treatment for the residents of Tikobo and Jomoro.

JOINT PHDC AND LANDS COMMISSION TEAM CONCLUDE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT SESSIONS IN JOMORO



The Petroleum Hub Development Corporation, in collaboration with the Lands Commission, concluded a comprehensive community engagement exercise in Jomoro, with strong confidence that the project has now gained the acceptance of the majority of the Jomoro people.

The exercise, which began on Monday, April 20, and ended on Thursday, April 23, 2026 at Ellenda, effectively addressed most of the critical issues impacting the thirteen communities.

One of the key concerns raised during the engagement was the significant reduction in land size earmarked for the project, shrinking from an initial 20,000 acres to

12,356 acres. This alteration has sparked discussions regarding land acquisition, with many locals seeking clarity on the compensation payment process.

Employment opportunities for local residents were another major topic of interest. Participants of the various engagement sought clarity on how the youth of the affected will be employed when the project is operational.

While they are hopeful that the project would create jobs and stimulate economic growth in the region, they contend that the youth of the affected communities must be given special dispensation relative to employment at the hub.

There were also concerns over the relocation of communities such as Old Kabenlasuazo and Nyamenle Kwame with residents urging the PHDC to expedite their relocation as they have been deprived of developmental project due to their status as 'moving communities'.

The Deputy CEO of Operations and Technical at the Corporation, Onasis Rosely, described the engagement as both successful and informative, expressing confidence that the community now has a better understanding of the project and its implications.

Throughout the engagement, Onasis Rosely maintained that the PHDC has a special plan to develop the capacities of the youth of Jomoro to ready them for the project.

The Municipal Chief Executive of Jomoro, Hon. Benedict Boadi, emphasised the importance of the engagement, stating that it marks the impending development of the Petroleum Hub project.

He noted with optimism, stating that the project will significantly transform Jomoro for the better and that the youth of Jomoro will no longer need to travel outside the area for job opportunities.

He mentioned the over 700,000 expected jobs set to be created by the project and encourage the people of the Jomoro to focus on the benefits that they will derive from the project and not be dissuaded by the actions of persons he deems to be against the development of Jomoro.

Additionally, the Western Regional Lands Commissioner, Nana Asante Yeboah, reassured the Jomoro community of his office's commitment to ensuring fair, prompt, and adequate compensation for the land set for acquisition.

He emphasized that the project should ultimately enhance the livelihoods of the local populace.

WHY LANDS COMMISSION PRESENTED GAZETTE TO CHIEFS, ASSEMBLY MEMBERS OF 13 COMMUNITIES AFFECTED BY THE PETROLEUM HUB PROJECT



One of the most prominent highlights of the latest community engagement exercise undertaken by the Petroleum Hub Development Corporation (PHDC), in collaboration with the Lands Commission, was the presentation of the official gazette to the Municipal Chief Executive of Jomoro, as well as the chiefs and assembly members of each of the thirteen communities.

From Old Kabenlasuazo, where the four-day engagement began, to Ellenda, where the joint PHDC and Lands Commission team concluded the programme, the Western Regional Lands Commissioner, Nana Asante Boateng I, supported by Surveyor, Mark Gudu, presented copies of the gazette to the chiefs and assembly members.

While the gazette presentation proceeded fairly smoothly in most communities, it became a major point of contention during the engagement at Takinta. There, the Assemblyman and the Chief of the community raised pertinent issues concerning the gazette.

What is the Gazette, and Why Was It Presented to Chiefs and Assembly Members?

The presentation of the gazette to the affected communities is a critical legal procedure derived from the Land Act, 2020 (Act 1036), which serves as the principal legislation governing compulsory land acquisition in Ghana.

As part of the compulsory acquisition process, the Lands Commission is mandated by law to publish a Declaration of Intent for Acquisition in a national newspaper. Following this publication, the Commission is required to officially inform the affected communities of the government's intention to acquire their lands for a specific project.

Upon receipt of the gazette, the chiefs and assembly members are legally required to post the notice of the government's intention at a place accessible to all members of their communities. In the specific case of the Petroleum Hub project, the gazette presented to the chiefs and assembly members of the 13 communities outlines the government's intention to acquire 12,356 acres (5,000 hectares) of land for the project.

Why Did It Become a Contentious Issue at Takinta?

Out of the 13 communities visited by the joint PHDC and Lands Commission team, most engagements were relatively smooth. However, the session at Takinta generated the most controversy and lasted significantly longer than the others.

From the registration of attendees to discussions about land size, almost every issue became contentious. The people of Takinta, who had gathered with information about their partial exclusion from the project, openly expressed their grievances.

One of the major issues was the initial refusal by the Chief of Takinta to sign the gazette when it was presented to him by Surveyor Mark Gudu.

The Chief argued strongly that appending his signature to the document would be interpreted as an acceptance of the reduction in the land size, thereby endorsing the exclusion of Takinta's lands from the Petroleum Hub project.

Fearing that future generations might blame him for failing to secure the community's full share of land in a project that could transform the area's fortunes, the chief initially declined to sign.

Nana Asante Boateng, however, explained that the document did not mean the government was immediately taking over the land. Rather, it was an official announcement of the government's intention to acquire 12,356 acres (5,000 hectares) of land from the Jomoro area for the Petroleum Hub project.

Following this explanation, Nana Abizi IV reversed his position and eventually signed the document, confirming that the people of Takinta had been officially informed of the government's intention to acquire the land.





PRESIDENT MAHAMA'S DIRECTIVE WAS TO REDUCE LAND SIZE TO 5000 HECTARES NOT 5000 ACRES – DCEO ONASIS ROSELY CLARIFIES

The Deputy Chief Executive Officer in charge of Operations and Technical at the Petroleum Hub Development Corporation (PHDC), Onasis Kobby Rosely, has set the record straight regarding the proposed land size for the Petroleum Hub project.

Addressing community leaders and residents during a stakeholder engagement at Tikobo in the Jomoro Municipality of the Western Region, Mr Rosely clarified that President John Dramani Mahama's directive for the reduction in the land size is 5,000 hectares (equivalent to 12,356 acres), and not 5,000 acres as has been widely speculated.

Providing background to the issue, Mr Rosely explained that during the PHDC's meeting with President Mahama in November 2025, land acquisition was one of the key issues discussed.

Following the briefing, the President directed the Minister of Lands and Natural Resources, Hon. Emmanuel Armah-Kofi Buah, to expedite the acquisition of 5,000 hectares of land and not acres, as alleged by some groups.

"We continue to receive numerous petitions concerning the land size. We had the opportunity to meet the President in November 2025, during which the land issue was raised as one of the major challenges we are facing," he said.

"The President, therefore, directed the Minister of Lands and Natural Resources to urgently address the matter and proceed with the acquisition of 5,000 hectares of land. Since then, we have engaged with the Lands Minister and the Lands Commission, and we have developed a clear roadmap for the acquisition process," he added.

Mr Rosely called for unity and full support for the project, warning that continued disputes over the land size and other related issues could further delay its implementation.

He also noted that several other communities have expressed strong interest in hosting the project, as they believe its successful implementation will bring significant socio-economic transformation to their areas.

The energy expert urged the chiefs, elders, and residents of Jomoro to focus on the immense socio-economic benefits the Petroleum Hub project will bring to the municipality when fully realised.

BOSS STORMS JOMORO FOREST TO RALLY LANDS COMMISSION AND VOLUNTEER TEAMS



On Wednesday, May 6 2026, the CEO of Petroleum Hub Development Corporation, Dr Toni Aubynn, paid a surprise visit to the joint Lands Commission and PHDC team that is working on the acquisition of the 12,365-acre land for the Petroleum Hub project.

Dr Aubynn travelled through the dense forests and communities within the project area to personally interact with the team and assess the progress of work being

carried out on the ground. The visit formed part of management's efforts to encourage the technical teams and gain a firsthand understanding of the ongoing acquisition processes.

Addressing the team, Dr. Aubynn commended the dedication and professionalism demonstrated by both PHDC and Lands Commission officials despite the demanding terrain and nature of the exercise. He urged them to remain focused and committed to the national assignment entrusted to them.

Dr. Aubynn also engaged the volunteers from the Jomoro Municipality who have been supporting the exercise, encouraging them to continue serving as ambassadors of the Petroleum Hub Project within their various communities. According to him, community cooperation and public understanding remain essential to the successful implementation of this project.

"We should pray and not be discouraged. The volunteers here should take it upon themselves to educate the people about the benefits this ambitious project will offer to the people of Jomoro when it's fully operational," he said.

In recent weeks, PHDC and the Lands Commission of Ghana have intensified activities in Jomoro as part of preparations toward the acquisition of land for the Petroleum Hub Project.

The exercise has involved extensive stakeholder engagements with the Western Regional House of Chiefs, landowners, and

residents to educate them on the land acquisition process and the benefits of the project.

The joint team has also been carrying out technical activities, including land demarcation, mapping, valuation, and data collection, across sections of the proposed project area. These activities are intended to ensure transparency, proper documentation, and fairness throughout the acquisition process in accordance with Ghana's legal procedures for compulsory land acquisition.

PHDC continues to maintain its stance that the Petroleum Hub project remains a strategic national initiative aimed at positioning Ghana as a major petroleum and petrochemical hub in Africa. The project is expected to attract significant investment, create jobs, and strengthen the country's energy security through a refining capacity of 900,000 barrels per stream day (bsd) and a storage capacity of 10 million cubic meters.

UAE SIGNALS STRONG INTEREST IN GHANA'S PETROLEUM HUB PROJECT

Touching on the broader significance of this initiative, Dr Aubynn described the Petroleum Hub Project as one of Ghana's most strategic industrial projects, with the potential to position the country as a leading petroleum and petrochemical hub within sub-Saharan Africa. He explained that the project is expected to boost local industrialisation, create employment opportunities and strengthen Ghana's energy resilience.

He therefore called on stakeholders, investors and the general public to support the vision of the Petroleum Hub Project, emphasising that the Corporation remains focused on building a world-class energy infrastructure that aligns with global sustainability standards while driving economic growth and national development.

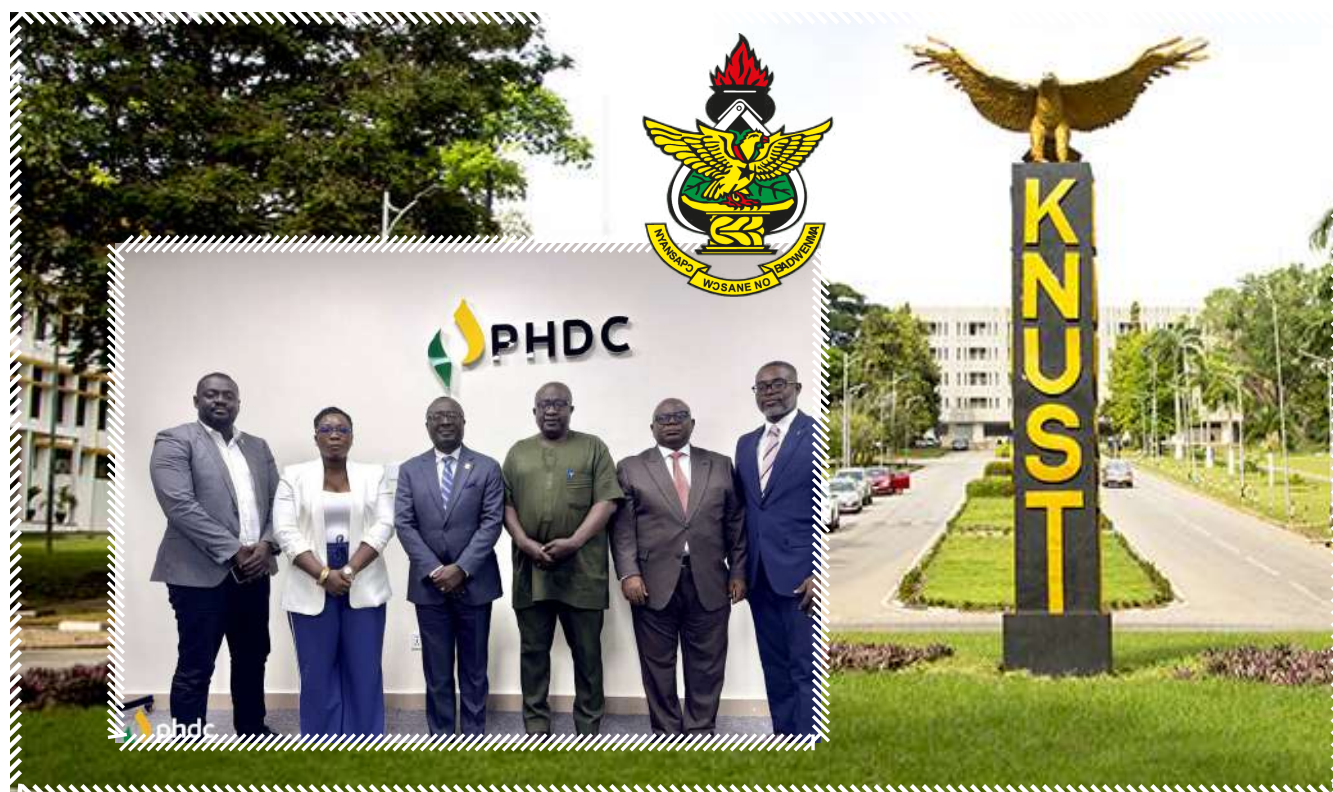

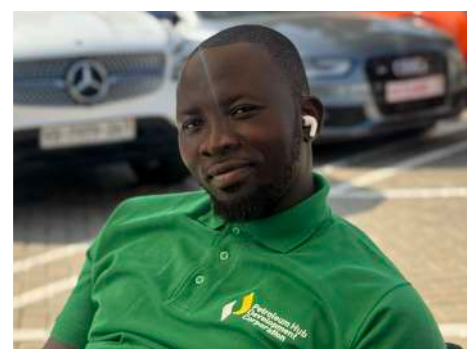
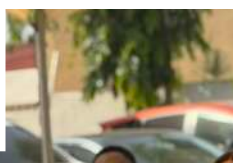
